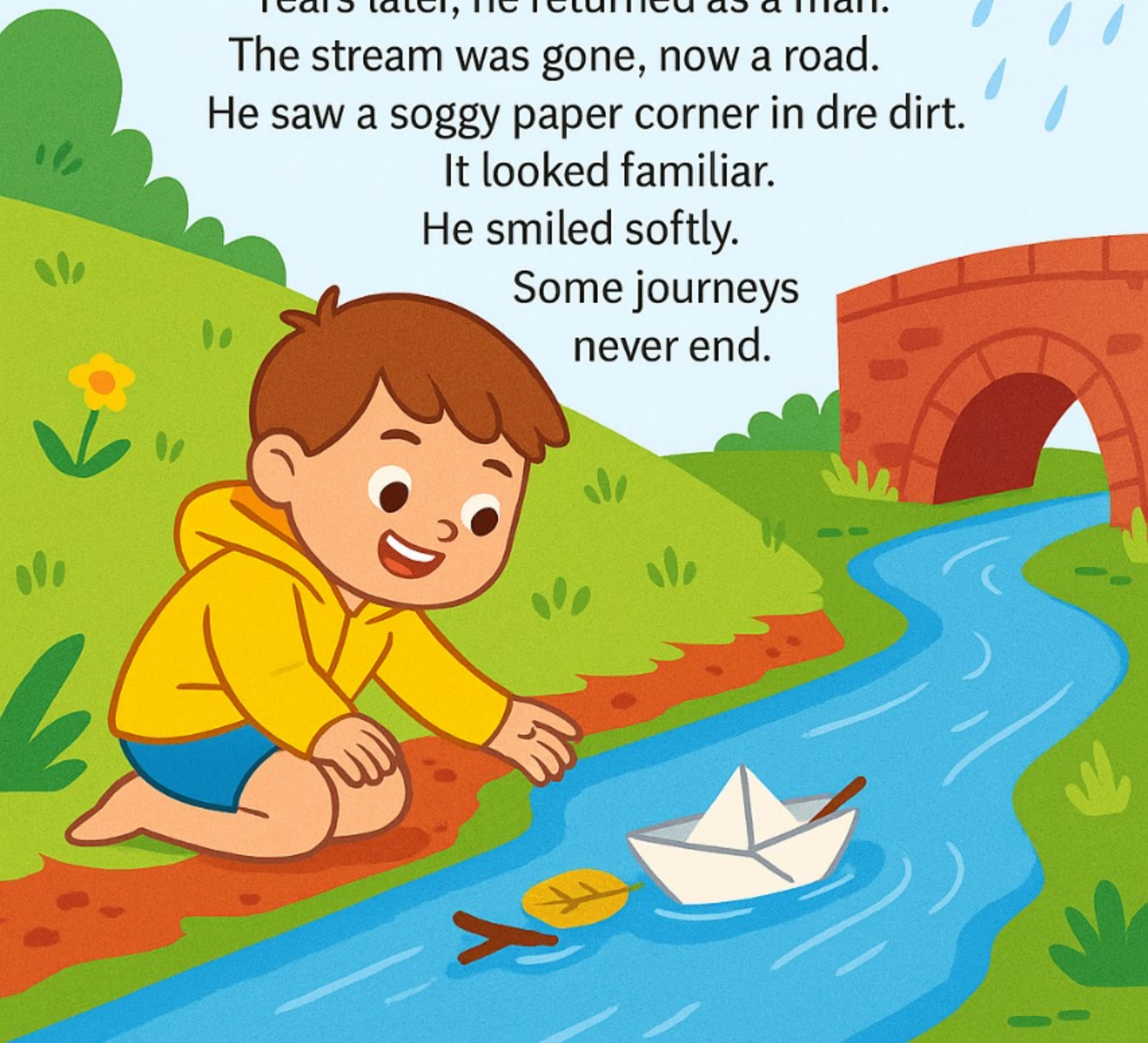

were happy.



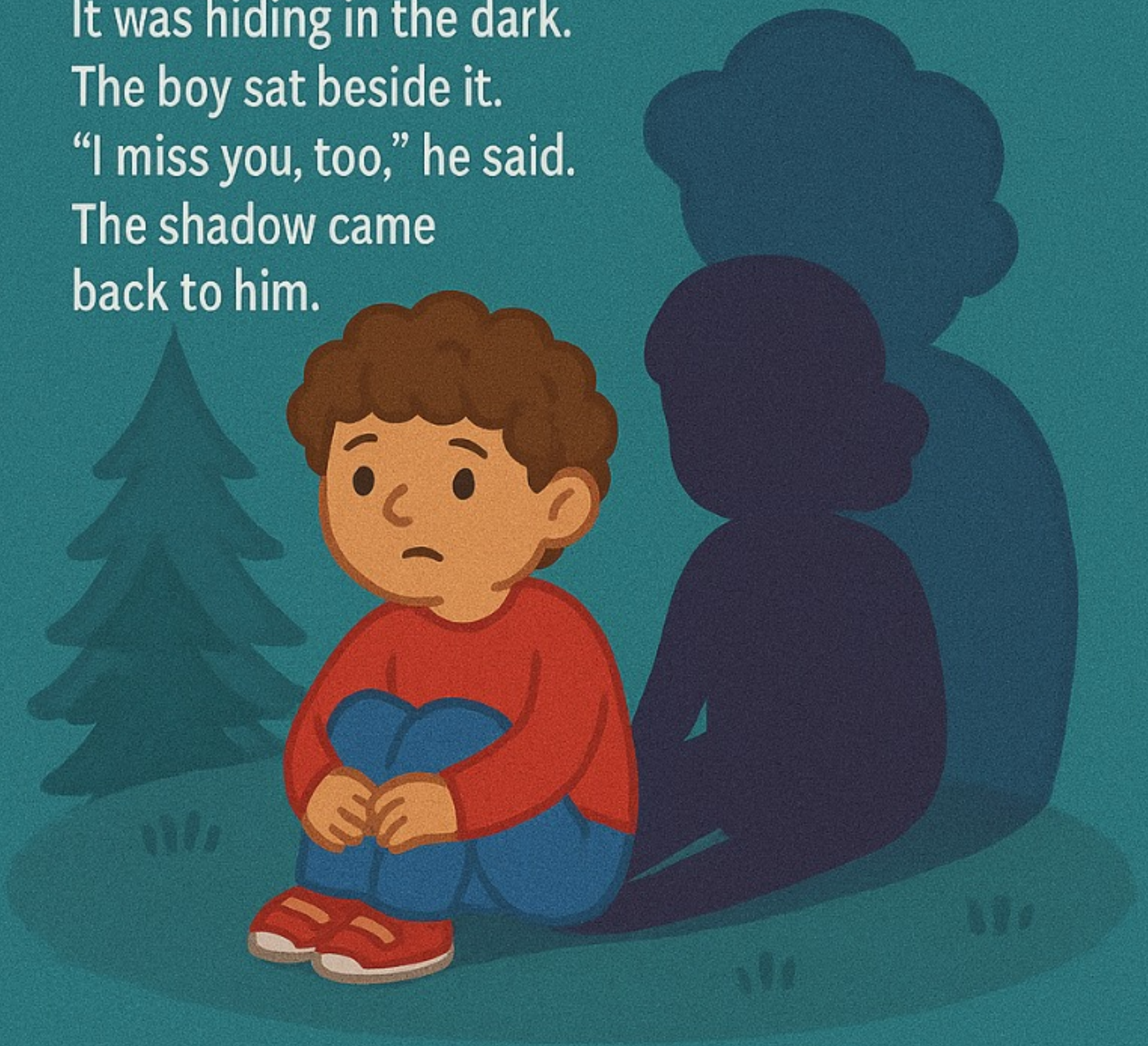
The Forest of Whispers

dreams.



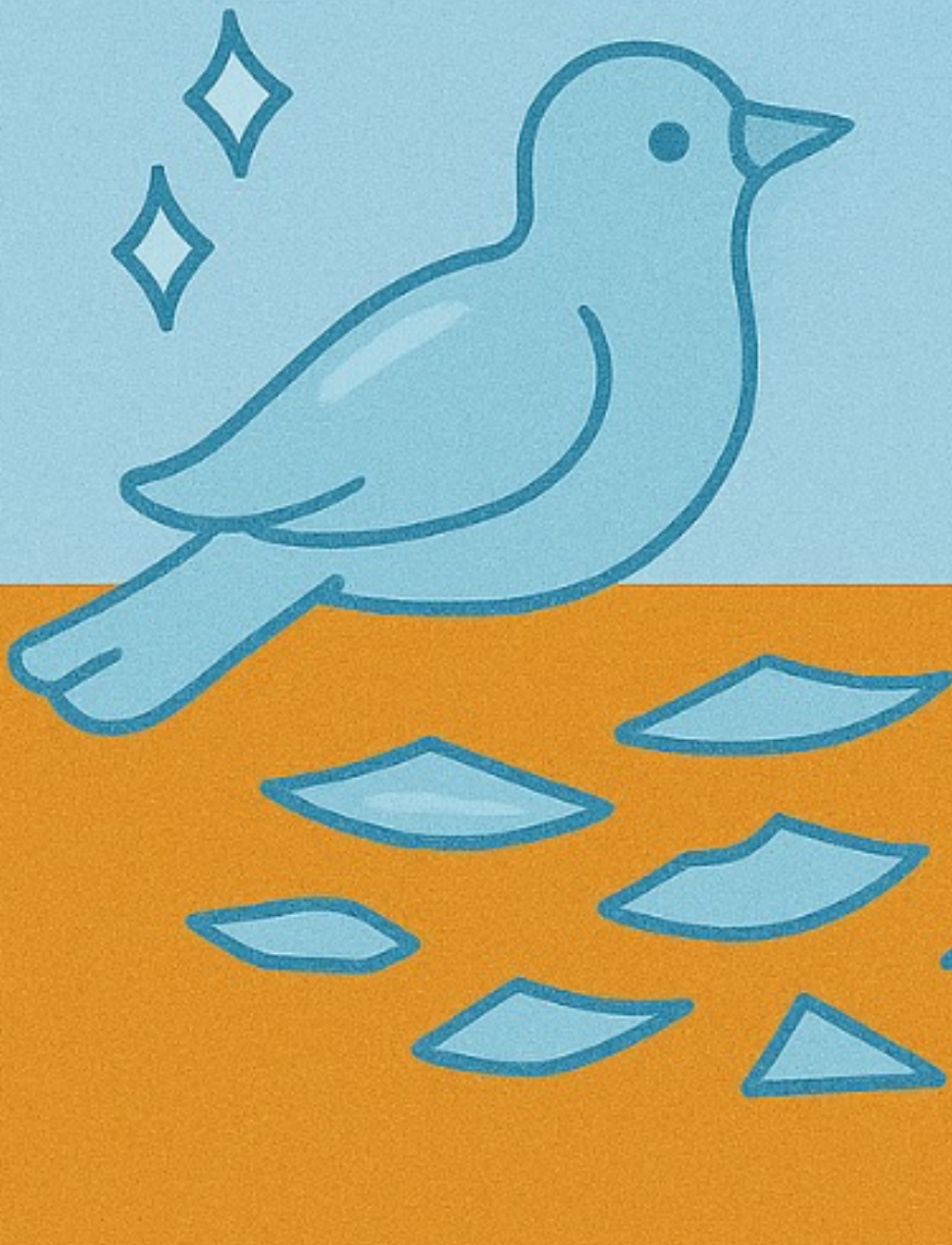
She Star Catcher

They went on adventures.

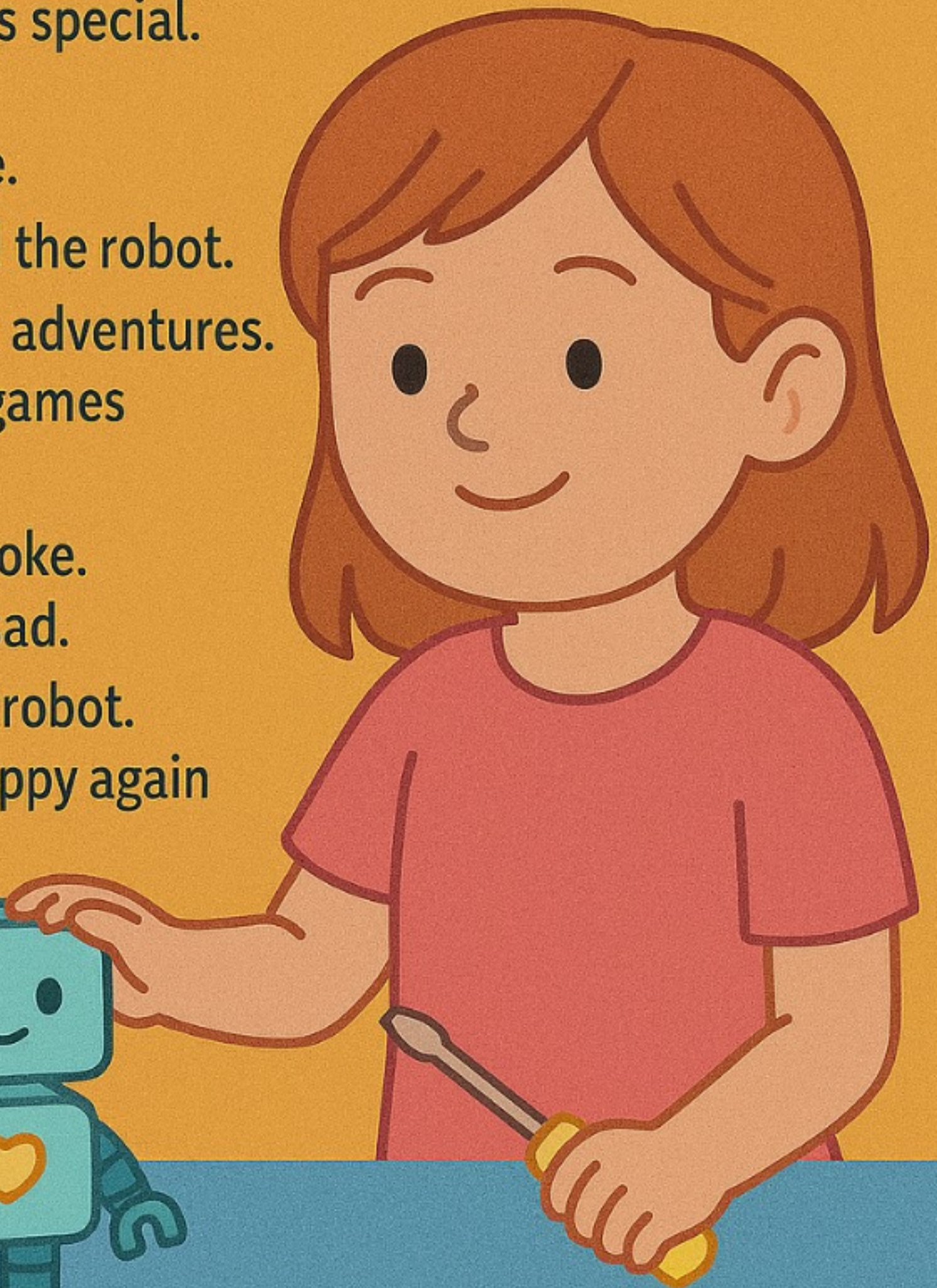
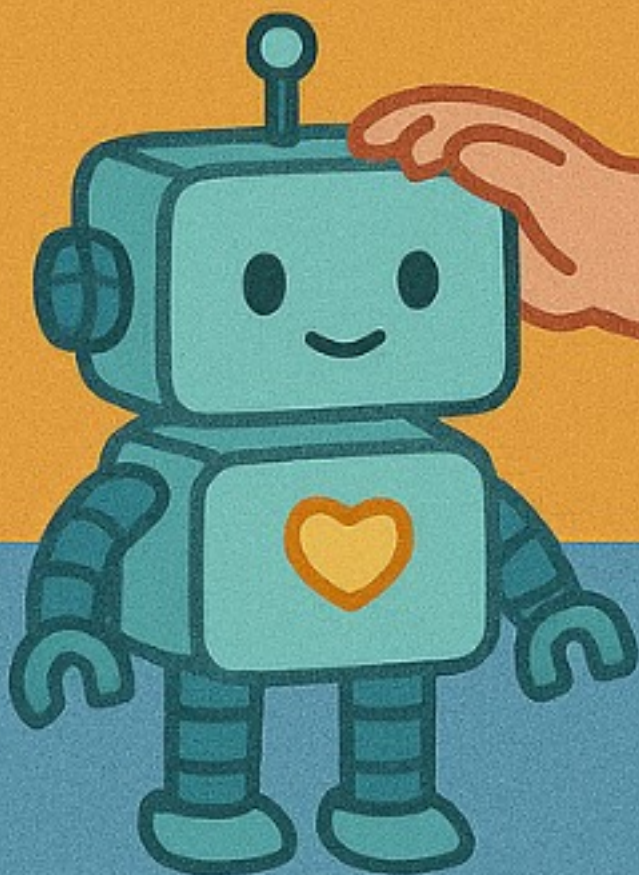
They played games

She fixed the robot.

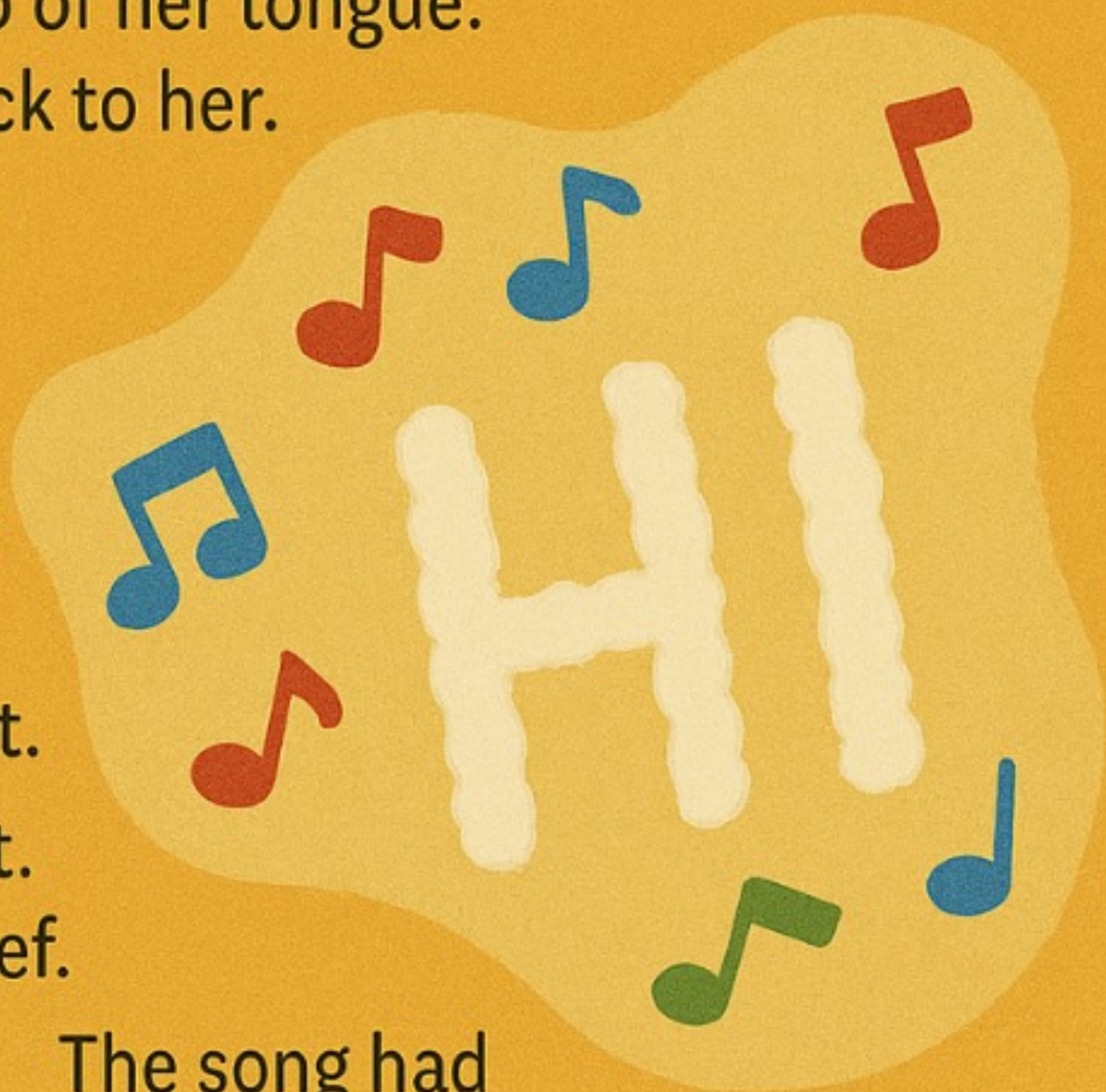
They were happy again

Suddenly, Emma noticed a bag lying on the ground. When she opened it, she was surprised to see it was full of gold coins!

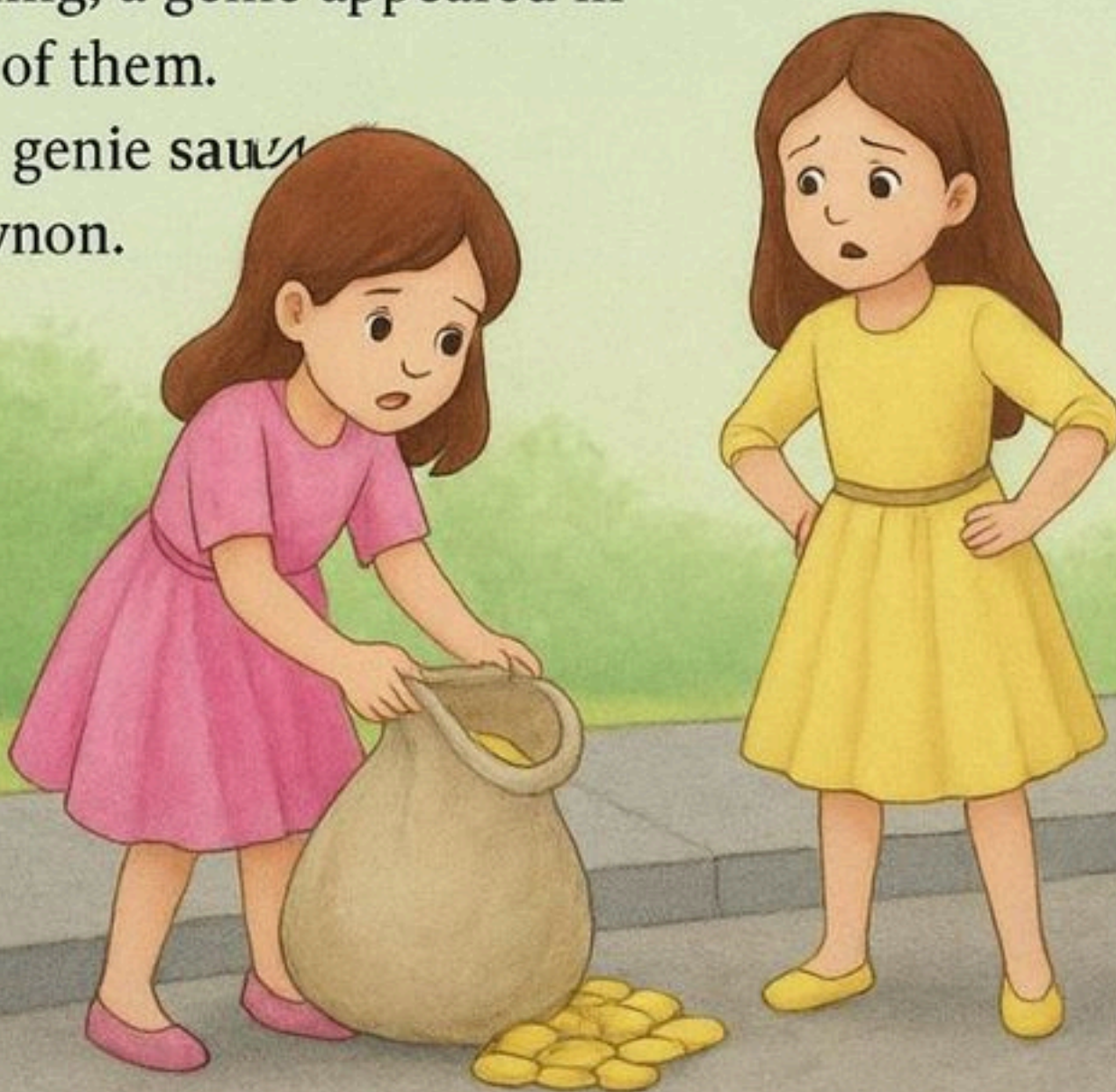
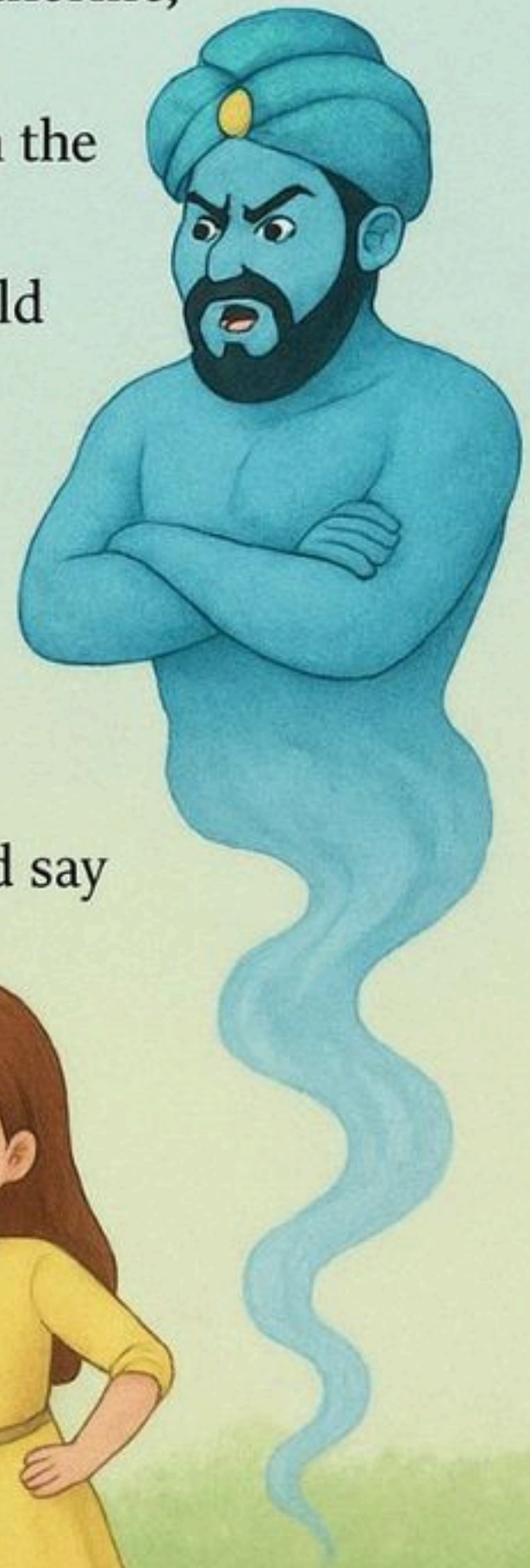
“Oh! We found a bag of gold coins!”

Emma quickly replied, “We? I was the one who found it. You were busy looking at the birds. These coins are mine.”


Katherine felt upset, but before she could say anything, a genie appeared in front of them.

The Wise Old Owl

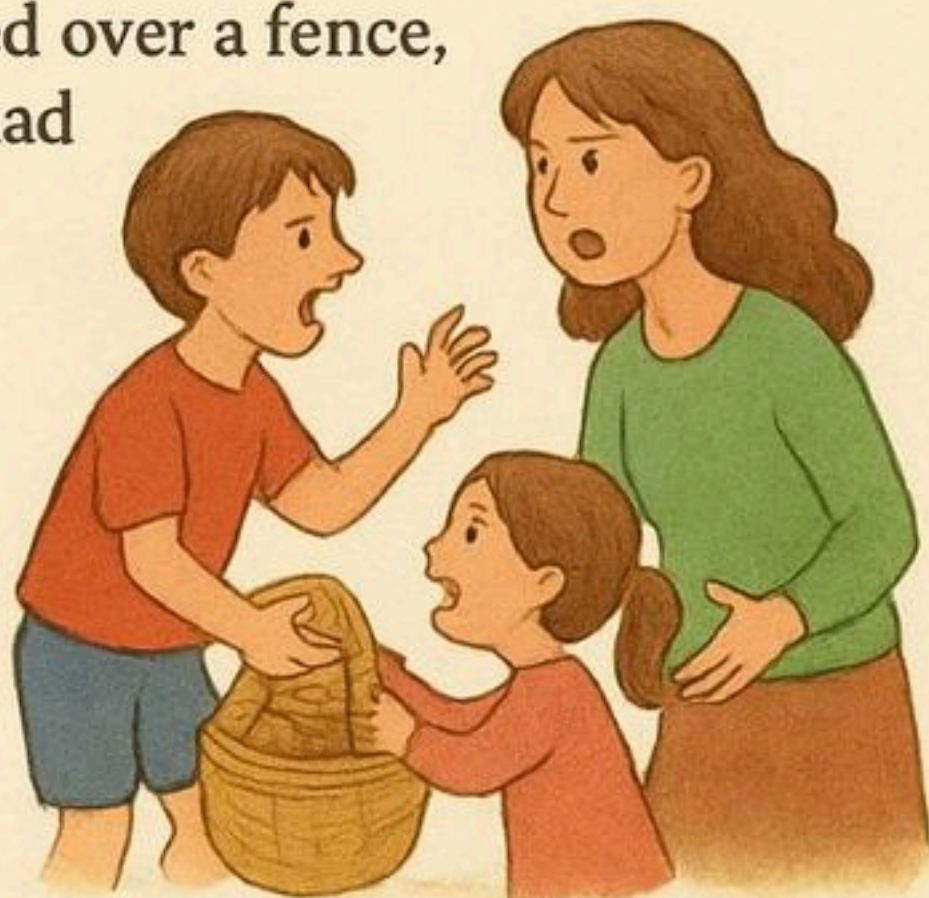
Once, an old owl lived in a big oak tree. Every day, he quietly watched what happened around him.

Moral: If we observe more, talk less, and listen carefully, we can become wiser too.

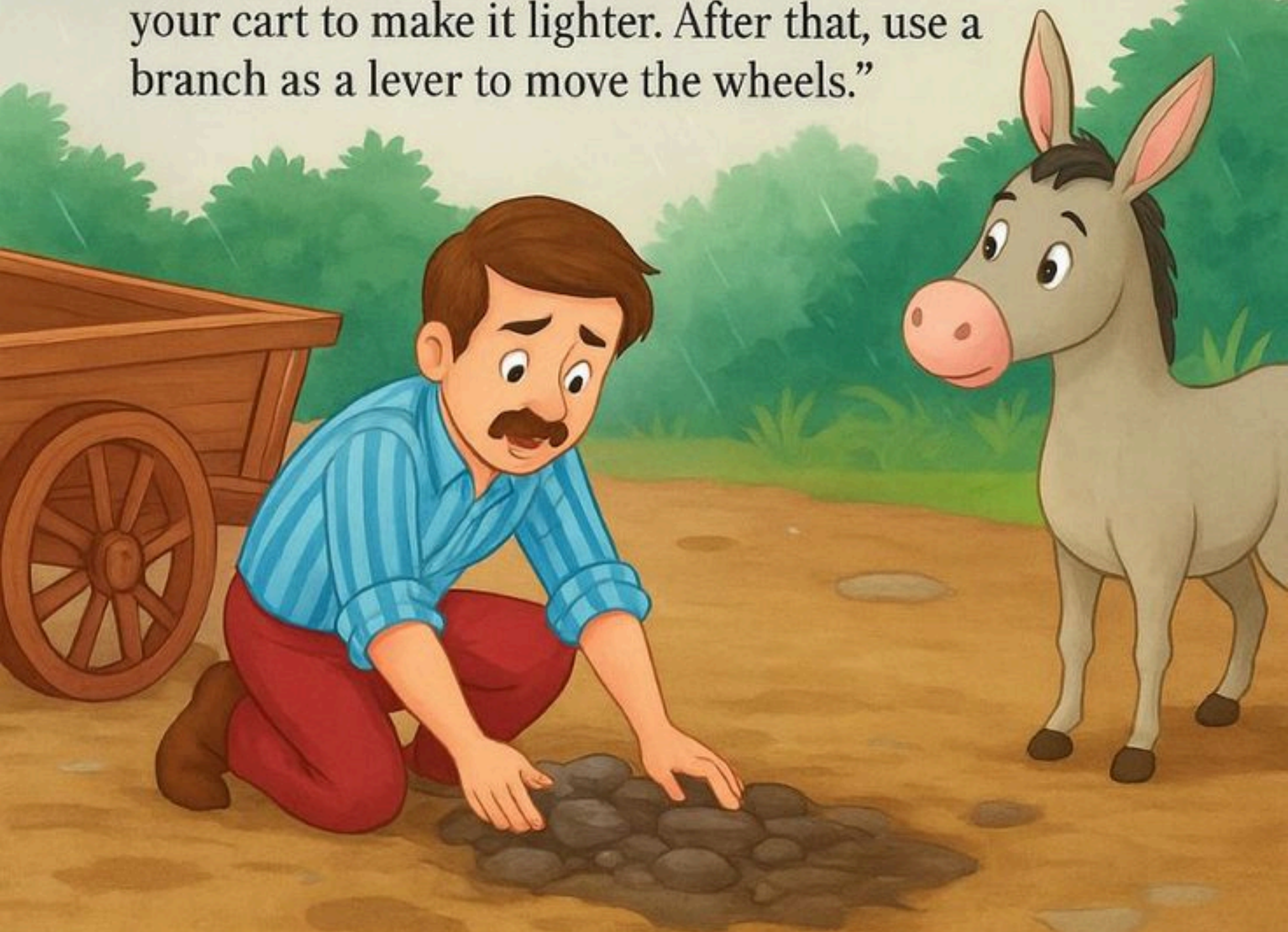


The Cart Driver's Helper

A mother's love is strong, brave, and always there to protect you.



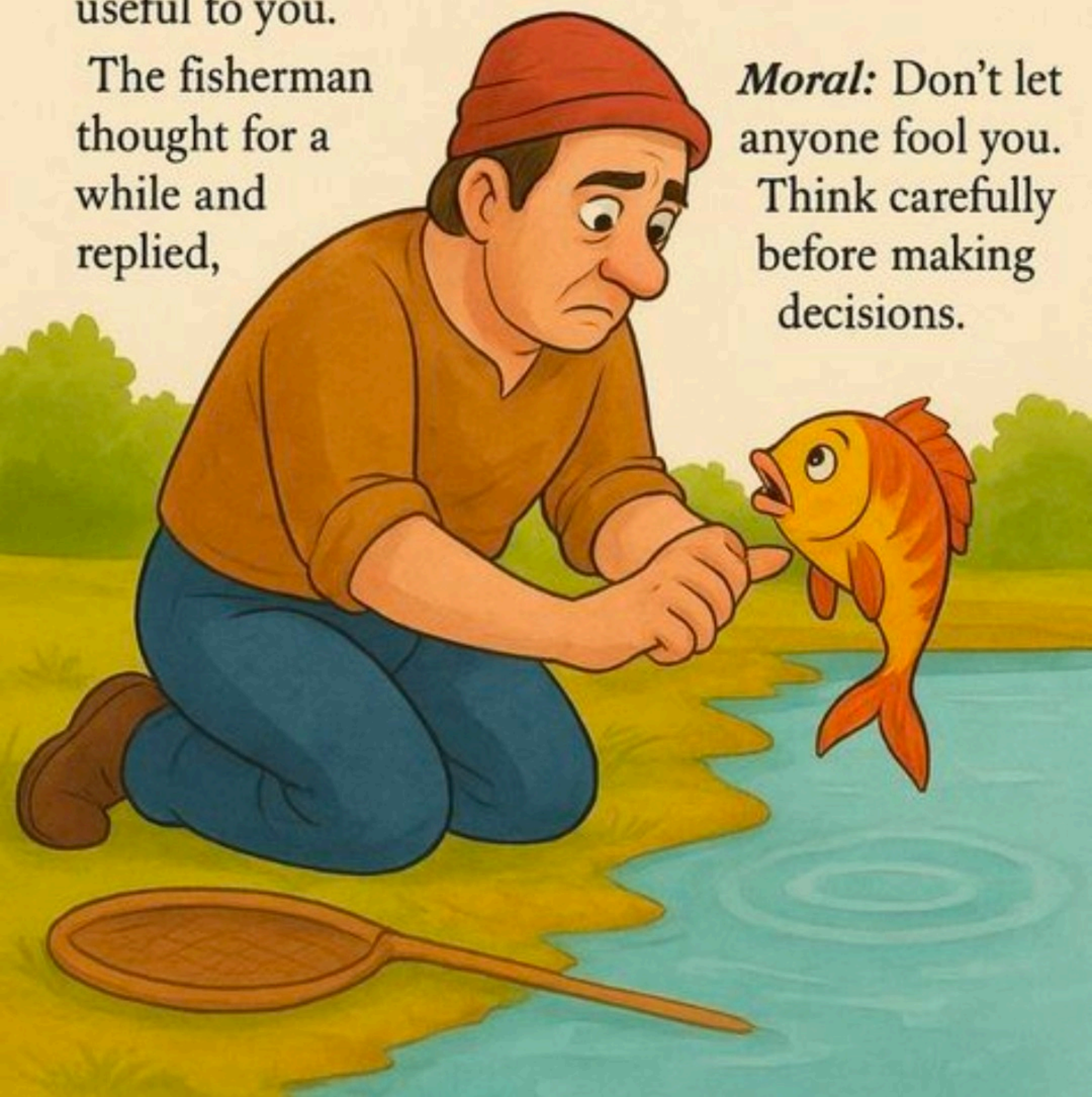
THE FISHERMAN AND THE FISH

After walking a few miles, she met some fairies. She asked them, "Have you seen the stars?"

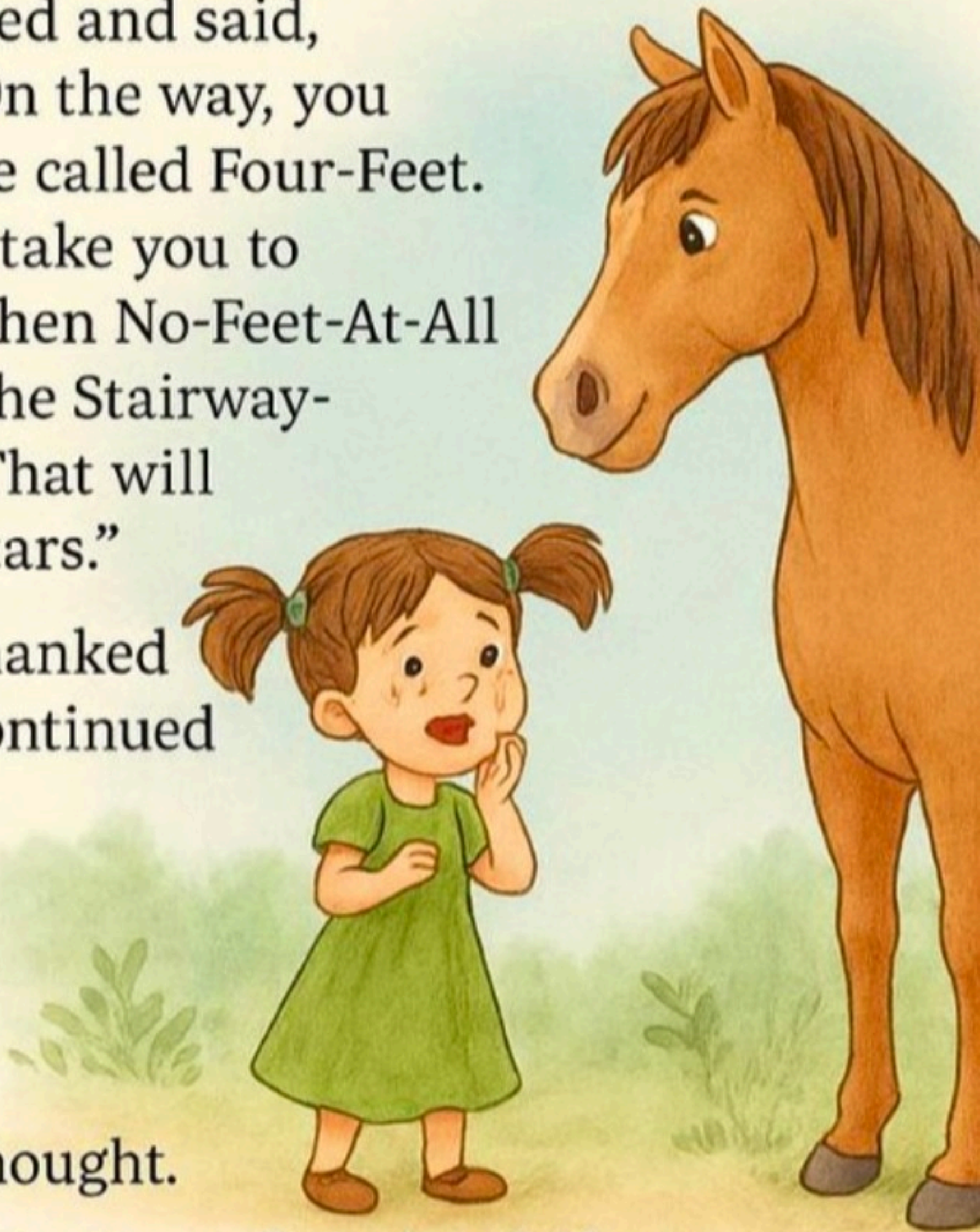
